

### The Two Greatest Powers


A priest friend once told me how he was called one night to the hospital to pray with a lady who was terminally ill. The lady's condition had deteriorated rapidly, but she was still in good spirit and conscious when he arrived. After a few minutes of conversation with the lady; getting to know her and hearing her story, the lady said, "I am dying Father and I am afraid." The priest paused for a while listening to the Holy Spirit's guide on a response, and he was led to some scriptural passages. One scriptural passage was when Jesus told his disciples, "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid" (Matt. 14:27). The second scriptural passage was from the prophecy of the prophet Isaiah, "Do not be afraid, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you..." (Isaiah 41:10).

The priest then asked the woman if it is possible that she would be afraid of her best friend who loves, supports, and wishes the best for her? The woman answered, no. The priest told her to take courage and not be afraid to take the next step forward, because her best friend is with her and He will accompany her through every journey.

From this story, there is present the interaction between human fear and its remedy of trusting love. The woman was afraid of losing her life and letting go of everything and everyone. But isn't this the drama going on in our lives on daily basis? Perhaps some might say the fear of losing their lives isn't active now, but the fear of losing something is often active; power, material possessions, status, job, health, loved ones, independence, freedom, etc. How do we respond to this fear of loss? Some people double down on their efforts to protect what they have, whether it be their freedoms, assets, or even their very lives. Some others live in denial of their fears. Yet we know deep down, sooner or later, that we will have to let go of everything and surrender to the mystery of love that is infinitely greater than all our fears. As Christians, we believe that this ever-present mystery of love that surrounds us is our God who knows us and wants us to be united with him. Therefore, it is only with the perfect love of the risen Lord that fear can be overcome.

### An Advisory from The Archdiocese of Detroit Department of Communications

### Regarding The Society of Our Lady, Queen of all Saints

Each of us in the Catholic faith community has a responsibility to reduce error, avoid schism, and promote ecclesiastical communion. To that end, the Archdiocese of Detroit shares the following information about a group operating in Southfield and elsewhere called "The Society of Our Lady, Queen of all Saints," which presents itself as "a group of Catholic clergy offering the traditional sacraments."

As of August 2025, the group was renting space in The Church of the Redeemer, an Episcopal church in Southfield. Previously, they occupied space in Taylor at the Little Rose Chapel Shrine, which has no affiliation with the Archdiocese of Detroit. An individual identifying himself as clergy from The Society of Our Lady, Queen of all Saints has visited Archdiocesan parishes in the area.

In the interest of truth and to avoid confusion among the faithful, we must clarify that, as best we are able to tell, The Society of Our Lady, Queen of all Saints is not an organization in ecclesiastical communion with the Catholic Church. Catholics are advised to avoid association with this group.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter. Let us pray that God will bring all Christian communities into full communion with the Roman Catholic Church, so that we may all be one. (cf. John 17:21)

### WEEK 1: UNDERSTANDING ALL SOULS DAY



As we approach the solemn feast of All Souls Day on November 2nd, we are reminded of the significance of this day within the Church's liturgical calendar. All Souls Day, which follows the celebration of All Saints Day, is dedicated to praying for the souls of all the faithful departed. It is a time for us to reflect on the mysteries of death and resurrection, grounded in our hope in Christ. This day invites us to remember that while death is a reality we all face, it is not the end but rather a transition to eternal life with God.

### WEEK 2: PRAYING FOR THE DEPARTED



All Souls Day invites us to engage in one of the spiritual works of mercy: praying for the souls of the faithful departed. This day serves as a reminder of our profound connection with those who have passed from this life and the important role that our prayers, Mass intentions, and acts of devotion can play in their spiritual journey. 


