

THE CHRISTIAN VIEW OF HUMAN DIGNITY: ARE YOU A TRUE DISCIPLE?

From a Christian perspective, human dignity is rooted in the understanding that every human being possesses an irrevocable ontological quality and moral implication that cannot be separated from their humanity. Unlike other creatures, every human being has an intrinsic worth that is an inalienable characteristic of human nature, because human beings are created in the Image of God (Imago Dei). God's breath of the spirit of life into the human person makes human beings unique creatures. Put differently, God's creation of man, used generically, and man's connection with God provides intrinsic dignity to humankind.

There is the recognition of human dignity as a moral principle. That is to say that morally speaking, every human being is entitled to respect. The respect that is the right of every human being is not dependent on money, race, gender, etc. It is the right of every human being as a member of the human species. Generally, therefore, the Christian view of human dignity is rooted in the theological trajectory of Imago Dei. That becomes the origin of the human dignity that every human being shares (Genesis 1:26–27). Consequently, human beings are called to responsibly participate in God's creation because of their unbreakable relationship with God. We participate in God's creation when we live the purpose of our lives here on earth.

Perhaps, it should be emphasized one more time that every human being has an intrinsic and natural value by virtue of just being a human being. The value is not based on external accidents. An individual's skin color, height, personal talents, good looks, social status, etc., for instance, does not increase or decrease the person's human dignity. Human dignity is inherent and intrinsic, obtained at birth because of one's humanness. Thus, there should be no room for discrimination, divisions, cliques, and looking down on others. The Christian God is a communion God, a God of unity not divisions. True disciples of God must be promoters of unity and communion in and of one body of Christ. And surely, true disciples of the Christian God must acknowledge and respect the dignity of every and all human beings because of the image and likeness of God in them. Are you a true disciple of the Christian God?



Black Catholic History Facts

1565: Blacks, both slave and free, helped to found this oldest city in the United States, St. Augustine, Florida. In 1693 Spain offers freedom in Florida to slaves who convert to Catholicism. Until 1763, these freed slaves lived in a community northeast of St. Augustine. Gracia Real de Santa Teresa de Mose, or Fort Mose, established in 1738, thus becomes the first free black town in the United States.

1780: The city of Chicago is founded by Jean Baptiste Point du Sable who participated in Catholic sacraments.

1781: Governor Don Felipe de Neve recruits 11 families to settle on the Porciuncula River, which is not Los Angeles. The settlers are all Catholic, a mix of Africans, Spanish, and Native Americans.

1889: Daniel Rudd calls the first Black Catholic Congress in Washington, D.C.

1909: The Knights of Peter Claver are founded in Mobile, AL, and, in 1922 the Ladies Auxiliary is authorized.

1920: The first seminary for Black men to study for priesthood, St. Augustine Seminary, is founded in Greenville, MS, by the Society of the Divine Word Missionaries.

1925: Xavier University of Louisiana is founded by St. Katharine Drexel.

1984: The Black Bishops of the United States release their document, What We Have Seen and Heart: A Pastoral Letter on Evangelization, was published.

1989: Servant of God, Sr. Thea Bowman, FSPA, addresses the USCCB about "What Does It Mean to Be Black and Catholic?"


