

WHAT IS THE MEANING OF LIFE?

Human life is embedded with mystery from its beginning, at conception, to its very end, at death. This mysterious nature of human life makes it impossible to do away with the idea of the supernatural throughout one's life. So, as humankind journeys through life, they are constantly searching for the source and origin of their fulfillment and happiness. This search takes on different dimensions during the various stages of human development and growth. It is often believed that the peak of this search for the supernatural during human life happens at midlife, perhaps because "the predominant questions at midlife have everything to do with life's meaning; they are, at root, spiritual matters. Carl Jung, noting a pertain amongst his patients in midlife, writes, "among all my patients in the second half of life, there has not been one whose problem in the last resort was not that of finding a religious outlook on life. It is safe to say that every one of them fell ill because they had lost what the living religions of every age have given to their followers, and none of them have been really healed who did not regain this religious outlook." Religious symbols keep people in touch with the unconscious. As some scripture scholars note, Christ is seen as the symbol of the self, the incarnation is seen as a paradigm of self-realization, and the events of the passion are seen as a prototype of suffering involved in the task of individuation. Spirituality and spiritual images play a significant role during the various stages of life and should be used when accompanying people.

Accompaniment invites us to a life of presence, to being there for others, and being our brother's and sister's keeper. This entails sacrificing for the common good. We are all called to be present to various members of our religious and civil communities, especially those who are going through different stages of life. It is in serving others; in helping them come to the realization of the meaning of life, do we find life's meaning. Thus, ours is a life of service, and through it do we come to understand and fulfil life's meaning and purpose.

St. Joseph's Society of the Sacred Heart

Do You Know The History of the St. Joseph's Society of the Sacred Heart?

Fr. Francis Asomkase and Fr. Charles Nwamadi have joined the Detroit Lower Eastside Family of Parishes and are members of the St. Joseph's Society of the Sacred Heart order of priests.

Since 1871, the Josephites have been in the mission of serving the African American community.

It began with a determined man named Cardinal Herbert Vaughn. In 1866, he opened a school named St. Joseph College of the Sacred Heart located in Mill Hill, England. Cardinal Vaughn's greatest desire was to send missionaries into all parts of the world. In May 1870, he petitioned the pope for a mission field. The choice was the United States.

For years the archbishop of Baltimore, Martin John Spalding, had been appealing to Rome for help in ministering to the thousands recently released from slavery. In 1871, Pius IX handed down the Negro Oath, which would shape the modern-day Josephites.

In Cardinal Vaughn's time, every missionary assigned to this duty was to sign this oath, which stated, among other things, that the priest would "vow and solemnly declare that I will make myself the father and servant of the Negroes; nor shall I ever take up any other work which might cause me to abandon, or in any way neglect the special care of the Negroes. So help me God and these His Holy Gospels."

With the oath in hand, Cardinal Vaughn and four missionary priests set off for Baltimore. Here Cardinal Vaughn consecrated the mission to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and named his missionaries the "Josephites," because St. Joseph was honored as the "first missionary." Together Cardinal Vaughn and the priests established a seminary, many parishes, schools and the beginnings of an interracial brotherhood. And so it continued. Missionaries would study at the college in Mill Hill in England and then travel to America for their foreign mission.

However, overseeing an international organization was difficult. So, in 1893, Cardinal James Gibbons of Baltimore offered to accept the Josephites as an independent organization and Cardinal Vaughn gave his consent. Father John Slattery became the first Superior General of the new American Josephites and set the direction of the newly independent society.

What began as a mission to help the newly freed slaves in America, evolved into the broader task of assisting all of the Black community. The Josephites continue in the tradition of Cardinal Vaughn and by the commission of Pope Pius IX, as a society dedicated solely to the service of the African American community.

November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month

November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month, a time to raise understanding, encourage prevention, and support those affected by this disease. Lung cancer remains one of the most common cancers worldwide, but early detection and healthy lifestyle choices can make a life-saving difference.

Know the Risk Factors:

Smoking is the leading cause, but even non-smokers can be affected.

Secondhand smoke, radon exposure, and air pollution also increase risk.

Steps for Prevention:

If you smoke, consider making this the month to quit—resources and support are available.

Test your home for radon and avoid exposure to harmful fumes.

Stay active and eat a balanced diet rich in fruits and vegetables.

Early Detection Matters:

If you are a current or former smoker aged 50–80, talk with your healthcare provider about low-dose CT screening, which can detect lung cancer early—often before symptoms appear.

Let's take this month to breathe easier by caring for our lungs and supporting those in our community facing lung cancer.

This month, as we focus on lung health, let us remember that every breath we take is a precious gift from God. 
