

Baptism of the Lord

Do you remember when Sally Fields received an award at the Oscars or Emmys or something like that? After she was announced as the winner, she came up, somewhat bewildered, and exclaimed, "They like me. They really, really like me!" People held on to that line for years because it resonated with most of us. Isn't that the struggle of our lives? Isn't it hard to believe that we are lovable, or likable, with all the things we know about ourselves? We spend our lives trying to show people that we are competent, holy, intelligent, in control, cool, pretty, handsome, courageous, generous and strong so that maybe, just maybe, people will find us worthy enough to be loved, or at least, respected and liked a bit.

Baptism is the reminder, like Sally Fields realized on that Awards Night, that God likes us. God really, really likes us. It's the reminder to all of us that we share the distinction with Jesus that we are the beloved child of God and that somehow in the midst of our brokenness, God is well pleased with us. Every time we come into church and bless ourselves, we are remembering the special bond we have with Christ as a beloved child of God. Each time we bless ourselves with the water that reminds us of our baptism, we can remember that the same Christ who met us at the waters of the font is with us still and loving us to our last moments. And even at our funerals, the waters of our baptism are brought back to remind all of us that the bond of love which was obvious at our baptism is not broken in death but continues into eternal life.

On this feast of the Baptism of the Lord, maybe we can remember the words that Jesus heard on this special day. Wouldn't it be great if that could be our mantra this year? In those moments when we feel like a failure. In those moments when we feel we let ourselves down or let others down, wouldn't it be wonderful to dust off the negativity and remember that we are still loved in all our brokenness? Wouldn't it be great if each of us, as we bless ourselves each time, would remember that we are loved by the community of the Father, Son and Spirit? On this feast, remember you have nothing to prove to anyone that you are worthy of love. You are loved beyond your wildest imaginings so scream at the top of your lungs that **you are the Beloved child of God** because you are!

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures

for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior.

"I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law."

Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. To learn more about the groundbreaking new church law, go to *detroitcatholic.com*.



Making a Report of Sexual Abuse

To inform the Archdiocese of Detroit regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests, deacons and other Church personnel and/or to speak to the Victim Assistance Coordinator contact: (866) 343-8055. A caller will be requested to provide his or her name and telephone number. All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. This toll-free number has been established as part of an effort by the Detroit archdiocese to protect children, young people and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes and ministries. This line is for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only. Persons with such complaints are also encouraged to directly contact law enforcement authorities. The Archdiocese of Detroit stands with the brave survivors who seek to bring the crime of child sexual abuse by clergy and other Church representatives into the light, where those who sinned are confronted and those who were harmed can find healing. To those harmed by the actions and inaction of Church leaders: It is inexcusable, and we are sorry. In an effort to consolidate our resources and respond to the faithful's questions about clergy sexual abuse, the Archdiocese of Detroit has created a new "mini" website at protect.aod.org. This site highlights reporting abuse, information about victim assistance, investigations, training for clergy and lay employees and volunteers, and provides additional resources, including messages from Archbishop Vigneron. Our goal is to make this important information - already available on aod.org - more visible, transparent and clear.
