Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Paul, in talking to the people of Corinth, calls them to a unity of spirit in Christ. There were factions in the community where some were following Apollos and others Cephas and others Paul. They were the "groupies" of each of these preachers and Paul reminds them that the only one we follow is Christ. We experience day after day the divisions in our world, in our country, and in some of our families. We become exhausted by the Democrats and Republicans fighting out the impeachment and we wonder if we are too far gone to ever come together as one again. Will there ever be a day when we can all work together for the common good? Will there ever be a day when there is mutual respect for one another rather than name calling and derogatory statements about each other? Paul warns the Corinthians not to get swept up in the rivalries and factions of their day. He reminds them and us that it is Christ who is our cornerstone. It is the Gospel that calls us to a different way of living in the world. It is the Gospel that calls us together to use our power not to bully people but to build the Reign of God.

If there are moments when we have to pick sides and stand up for what is right, then the side we stand on is the side of those who are poor, ostracized, humiliated, voiceless. We can never go wrong if we choose to be with those society may say are the unimportant ones in our world. If we stand with them and for them, we will be standing with Christ. It is in that communion we will find our unity of purpose as we create what Dr. Martin Luther King Jr called the "beloved community."

The other image that the readings from Isaiah and the Gospel give us today is the image of light in the darkness. We can point to the deep darkness in our world these days: mass shootings, the opioid epidemic, the mother and son found frozen in their home because they had no heat, the struggle of immigrants, all of the personal struggles in our families that we encounter each day, and the list could go on for miles. Yes, the darkness does seem dark some days, but the light is always there and each of us carries it in our hearts. How many times have we seen in the midst of a tragedy, a tremendous light of heroism or compassion or generosity pour forth from individuals and communities? It is our call and responsibility as followers of Christ to bring the power of His light into our world. When we do that, we begin to inspire others to be light as well and before you know it, we have a flame of Divine love in our world. With all of the division these days, we need that flame of light and hope more than ever!

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures

for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior.

"I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law."

Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. To learn more about the groundbreaking new church law, go to *detroitcatholic.com*.



Making a Report of Sexual Abuse

To inform the Archdiocese of Detroit regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests, deacons and other Church personnel and/or to speak to the Victim Assistance Coordinator contact: (866) 343-8055. A caller will be requested to provide his or her name and telephone number. All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. This toll-free number has been established as part of an effort by the Detroit archdiocese to protect children, young people and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes and ministries. This line is for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only. Persons with such complaints are also encouraged to directly contact law enforcement authorities. The Archdiocese of Detroit stands with the brave survivors who seek to bring the crime of child sexual abuse by clergy and other Church representatives into the light, where those who sinned are confronted and those who were harmed can find healing. To those harmed by the actions and inaction of Church leaders: It is inexcusable, and we are sorry. In an effort to consolidate our resources and respond to the faithful's questions about clergy sexual abuse, the Archdiocese of Detroit has created a new "mini" website at protect.aod.org. This site highlights reporting abuse, information about victim assistance, investigations, training for clergy and lay employees and volunteers, and provides additional resources, including messages from Archbishop Vigneron. Our goal is to make this important information - already available on aod.org - more visible, transparent and clear.
