In keeping with Black History month, we will share a few more stories of Heroic Catholics of Color.

Mother Mary Lange

Mother Mary Lange founded the Oblate Sisters of Providence, the first religious congregation for African-American women. Born Elizabeth Lange in Cuba, around 1794, she received an excellent education as a child – a privilege that would allow her to teach many children and orphans of color after moving to Baltimore. Elizabeth joyfully accepted a priest's invitation to establish a religious congregation devoted to the education of African-American girls. She took the name, Mary, at a time when many Catholics thought that black religious women were a disgrace. Through many oppositions, Mary kept her faith in Providence, giving of herself and all her material possessions for the well-being of all those whom she served.

Daniel Rudd

Daniel Rudd was a Catholic layman, civil activist and son of former slaves. Born in Kentucky in 1854, Rudd proclaimed that the Catholic Church welcomed African-Americans, in a time of declared segregation among Christians. He founded the first newspaper by an African-American, the American Catholic Tribune, in 1886. The paper would become a stepping-stone for Rudd's real vision: In 1889, he held the first National Black Catholic Congress in Washington, D.C. A talented journalist, speaker and teacher, Rudd would become one of the most influential African-American Catholics in U.S. history. (Courtesy of the *Denver Catholic*)

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines procedures internal for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. Stewardship Minute: Follow the Light

In today's Scripture readings from Sirach, Psalm 119, and St. Matthew's Gospel, we learn that wholeheartedly following God's commands and directives helps pave the way to eternal salvation. Be mindful that darkness influences secular society, which barrages us every day with temptations that attempt to block our relationship with Christ. Yet, if we are to deepen our personal relationship with Jesus, we must fight temptation that moves us to sin. We are truly free when we find and follow God's will, not our own pleasures and desires. Jesus proclaims in St. Mark's Gospel: *For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake and that of the Gospel will save it.* In St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthian community, he reminds us of the Spirit of Wisdom that leads us. Prompted by the Spirit and approached with a contrite heart, the Sacrament of Reconciliation provides an outpouring of mercy, forgiveness, and grace to overcome one's sins and weaknesses. Make time for this important sacrament this week.

Winter Heating and Energy Assistance

With the winter weather getting colder, it is more important than ever to keep yourselves and your loved ones warm and safe. During these months, some residents may struggle to pay their heating or electric bills and be faced with the prospect of having their heat shut off due to non-payment. Michigan law provides shut-off protections for eligible customers, and several local aid agencies are able to provide energy assistance payments to help qualifying low-income customers pay their energy bills to avoid potential shut offs. Below you'll find suggestions for saving energy, links to informational consumer tips and a wide range of other helpful consumer resources.

If you're behind on your energy bill, you can apply for help in paying off your past-due balance starting Nov.1 if your income is below 150 percent of the poverty level. Call 2-1-1 or visit <u>www.mi211.org</u> to learn about agencies in our area that may assist with your energy bill.

Assistance Programs

State Emergency Relief: Income-eligible households may receive assistance with heat or electric bills during extreme hardship or for emergencies that threaten health and safety. Contact the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (*Michigan.gov/mdhhs*) to learn more. Call 2-1-1 to learn about other energy assistance programs.

Michigan Energy Assistance Program: The Michigan Public Service Commission administers the **Michigan Energy Assistance Program (MEAP)** *(Michigan.gov/mpsc)*. The purpose of the MEAP is to establish and administer programs statewide that provide energy assistance and self-sufficiency services to eligible low-income households.

Medical Emergency Protection: Protections are available for those in a medical emergency, whose health would be aggravated by lack of utility service; and critical care customers, whose medical equipment or life support system would be immediately life-threatening without utility service. Contact your gas or electric company for more information.
