We are blessed to have two faith filled men coming into the parish this year. Orlando and Demetricke, you give us great hope as you make the choice to enter the Church. Please know that we are so grateful for your presence in our community and we will do our best to support you on this journey of faith. God bless both of you as you prepare for Easter.

The Gospel speaks of the moment when Christ goes up to the mountain with Peter, James and John and is transfigured before their eyes. Peter is overwhelmed by this moment and says, "It is good for us to be here! Let us make three tents: one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah." Peter, like all of us, wanted to hold on to that powerful moment and stay there but he had to come down and leave the mountain and go back to his life. It's the same with us. We have all had transfiguration moments when we realized the power of the Divine. Maybe it was the birth of our child or grandchild, maybe it's falling in love, maybe it's the beauty of a spectacular sunrise or the vibrant colors of a sunset, maybe it's the quiet of the woods or the rushing waves of the ocean. Whatever that moment is, we can't stay there, forever. Like all of life, it is passing. The wonderful part is that we hold on to it in our memory and it is there to be remembered when we find ourselves in the desert or going through the storms of life. Maybe take some time this week to think about those transfiguration moments in your life and allow them to bring you hope, courage and a deeper faith that God is always with us.

As we go through this season, I hope we can all check in to some of Jesse Cox's Lenten presentations. They are thought provoking and inspiring (and we also get to see each other on the zoom calls!) I would like to allow people the opportunity to have some private prayer in the church during the **Fridays of Lent (3/5, 3/12, 3/19, 3/26). Nativity will be open from 11am to 1pm and St. Charles will be open from 1:15 to 3:15pm.** During that time, you can have some private prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, or make the Stations of the Cross on your own or I will be there for the Sacrament of Reconciliation. #### Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse:

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1st. See detroitcatholic.com to learn more. Individuals with knowledge of sexual abuse by clergy or church representatives are urged to contact local law enforcement and the Michigan Attorney General's office. #### What are the Three Ministry Areas Within a Family of Parishes?

**Governance and Leadership** primarily covers the clergy of a Family and those major Councils and Teams which support the clergy in their mission. After carefully considering the work and recommendation of those focused on developing this area, Archbishop Vigneron has endorsed two models of governance for our Families of Parishes: the One-Pastor Model and the In Solidum model. (See "Who will lead our Family of Parishes?" in the "Key Questions" section.)

**Mission Direct** primarily covers those ministries which work directly with the faithful in achieving the mission.

**Mission Support** primarily covers those ministries which support the Family through functions that do not work directly with the faithful.

How will each Family choose which governance/leadership model (One Pastor or Moderator) to adopt? Also, What if there's no consensus, or there's a tie vote?

Rather than relying solely on vote tallies, the clergy within each Family will be encouraged to pray and listen to the Holy Spirt to arrive at consensus. If no consensus is reached, Archbishop Vigneron will make a final decision, in consultation with the regional bishop and Curia staff.

#### **Stewardship Minute:**

Second Sunday of Lent

The topic of sacrifice links today's First and Second Readings. In Genesis, Sarah and Abraham are blessed in their older years with their only son, Isaac. God tests Abraham by directing him to sacrifice Isaac. As Abraham is about to follow through, a messenger from heaven proclaims: Abraham, Abraham! ... Do not lay your hand on the boy .... Abraham offers a ram in place of his son. To encourage the Christian community in Rome, St. Paul reminds them that God sacrificed His only Son ... who intercedes for us. In St. Mark's Gospel, the evangelist tells of Christ's Transfiguration, where God the Father clearly reveals Jesus in His glorified state. Jesus then alludes to Peter, James, and John of His death and Resurrection. Our own giving of the "first fruits" of our prayer, service, and generosity back to God, our parish, and our neighbor, are solid acts of Christian love. Sacrifice brings great joy, peace, and grace to those who embrace stewardship in their lives. This Lent, in a spirit of evangelization, pause and reflect on how you can use your Godgiven gifts to spread the Good News of the Gospel.

#### Led By the Spirit On Mission

Over the next year-and-a-half, all parishes in the archdiocese will join together into groups of three to six, called "Families of Parishes." Going forward, these Families of Parishes will work together, sharing resources and talents to further advance the shared mission of our local Church.

The Family groupings have been compiled in the last few months through consultation with the auxiliary bishops and priests, a process steeped in prayer and with attention given to the best interest of each community.

In the meantime, to help us all better understand why we are moving in this direction, Archbishop Vigneron has written a new Pastoral Note on Families of Parishes, providing some theological context for the transition and introducing a renewed structure for parish ministry to more effectively equip them for their missionary work. Like all Pastoral Notes released in recent years, this new text is informed by and expands upon the steady foundation of Archbishop Vigneron's 2017 Pastoral Letter. Unleash the Gospel.

Looking into the not-too-distant future, Archbishop Vigneron also uses this new Pastoral Note to anticipate the development of Family Missionary Strategic Plans, which will guide each Family of Parishes as it carries out its work in the years to come.

Persons with such complaints are also encouraged to directly contact law enforcement authorities. The Archdiocese of Detroit stands with the brave survivors who seek to bring the crime of child sexual abuse by clergy and other Church representatives into the light, where those who sinned are confronted and those who were harmed can find healing. To those harmed by the actions and inaction of Church leaders: It is inexcusable, and we are sorry. In an effort to consolidate our resources and respond to the faithful's questions about clergy sexual abuse, the Archdiocese of Detroit has created a new "mini" website at protect.aod.org. This site highlights information about reporting abuse, victim assistance, investigations, training for clergy and lay employees and volunteers, and provides additional resources, including messages from Archbishop Vigneron. Our goal is to make this important information - already available on aod.org - more visible, transparent, and clear.
