

### Third Sunday of Lent

The first reading from Exodus today sounds very familiar and reminds us of human nature. The Israelites have been delivered from the hands of the Egyptians. They have seen the Red Sea parted for them so they could escape the slavery of the Egyptians. They have seen Pharaoh and his armies defeated. Their problem is that they have forgotten all the ways God had blessed them and now they grumble and quarrel and complain in the desert. They wonder if God is with them or not.

This incident in the desert where the Israelites question God and quarrel among themselves because things didn't work out the way they expected seems like many of us. How quickly we have overlooked the blessings of this day already (i.e. we woke up and were able to get out of the bed, we were able to walk and get dressed, many of us have a job to go to and a car to drive us there, many of us have loving, supportive families who remind us how much we're loved and the list of blessings goes on and on). We usually just take these blessings for granted each day as if we're entitled to them but let us get a flat on the way to work or wake up with a cold or headache or realize the furnace is not working and we cry out to the heavens: "Why me. Lord??"

Lent is a good time to be more conscious of the many overlooked and unnoticed blessings that come to us each day. When we live in a spirit of gratitude, we will be less likely to complain and grumble about the minor irritations that come our way each day. I have been inspired by friends who are going through terrible life threatening illnesses and have reason to grumble and complain and ask, "why me, Lord?" but they don't. They talk about how blessed they are because they know deep in their hearts that the same God who brought them this far will be with them even if their illness results in death. I think when life brings us to our knees, we realize all is gift.

I wish I could say I don't grumble or complain or question God, but I do. I take my many blessings for granted and zero in on what I don't have or what's gone wrong during the day. I ask you to join with me in taking time each day to go over all the ways we have been blessed that day. We will find greater joy when we live in a spirit of gratitude. Let's not let the blessings pass us by this week and when we find ourselves complaining, let's stop and remember how good God has been to us!

#### **Stewardship Thoughts**

Today we hear about the Transfiguration. In this gospel passage, Jesus' appearance changes into something blinding and divine which is somewhat overwhelming for Peter, James, and John. Add to that the appearance of Moses and Elijah and the booming voice of God from heaven, and it isn't difficult to understand why Peter might have been baffled. The emphasis in this reading seems to be on the majesty and divinity of Jesus, but there is another story of transformation being told -- that of Peter, the disciple. Peter was a devoted follower of Jesus, but he was a bit of a slow learner, and that makes him very much like many of us. It took a major spectacle for him to understand who and what the Messiah really was! Consider your own progress as a disciple. Perhaps you, too, are a devoted follower of Jesus Christ. How then might you, like Peter, be transformed during this 40 day fast? Pray that God will reveal Himself in a unique way that allows you to more deeply understand Him and share your faith with others!



#### Making a Report of Sexual Abuse

To inform the Archdiocese of Detroit regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests, deacons and other Church personnel and/or to speak to the Victim Assistance Coordinator contact: (866) 343-**8055.** A caller will be requested to provide his or her name and telephone number. All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. This toll-free number has been established as part of an effort by the Detroit archdiocese to protect children, young people and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes and ministries. This line is for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only. Persons with such complaints are also encouraged to directly contact law enforcement authorities. The Archdiocese of Detroit stands with the brave survivors who seek to bring the crime of child sexual abuse by clergy and other Church representatives into the light, where those who sinned are confronted and those who were harmed can find healing. To those harmed by the actions and inaction of Church leaders: It is inexcusable, and we are sorry. In an effort to consolidate our resources and respond to the faithful's questions about clergy sexual abuse, the Archdiocese of Detroit has created a new "mini" website at protect.aod.org. This site highlights information about reporting abuse, victim assistance, investigations, training for clergy and lay employees and volunteers, and provides additional resources, including messages from Archbishop Vigneron. Our goal is to make this important information - already available on aod.org - more visible, transparent and clear.
