Today we hear the Gospel of the blind man being healed by Jesus. We also hear in the first reading the choosing of young David to be king rather than his older brothers. It's a reminder to me that there is a difference between sight and vision. Sight is a physical thing while vision is being able to see the deeper meaning of our lives. It is seeing through the eyes of God. The choice of David, the youngest son of Jesse tending the sheep, gives us a little insight into the vision of God. God doesn't just see this youngster with no experience, but he sees a King!

In the Gospel, Jesus doesn't just see the blindness and spend his time on questions of why this man was born blind. What Jesus sees is a person, a mother's child, who is struggling and needs compassion and healing. While those around him want quick answers to why this man was born blind, Jesus only cares about the individual. How many people pass this man by and blame his blindness on his sins and the sins of his family? How many were not able to see beyond his outward disability? I think it's easy to label people and blame victims for their problems, so we feel justified in not helping them. "He's alcoholic and just needs to stop drinking," or "she's a single mother and has to be responsible for her choices in life," or "if he would just get a job, his mental illness would go away." I certainly am not endorsing enabling addiction or bad behavior but what would God's vision be for these people? Wouldn't God see them with a vision of who they were meant to be? God didn't create anyone to be an addict or poor or on the streets or in prison or on a soup kitchen line. No, God created them for victory. When we make judgments on others and those judgments don't help that person, we are seeing with our limited sight. Maybe our prayer this Lent is to ask the Lord to help us see as he sees. Perhaps, we ask for the vision to see more deeply into the struggle of those we have labeled as not worthy of our time or help.

The other question we may want to ask is what vision God has for each of us. Was God hoping we would do greater thing than we've done because we've settled for mediocrity? Is our playing it safe keeping us from living the vision of God? Are our fears keeping us back from the full life God desires for us? We will need some quiet time during Lent to ponder what the vision of God is for our lives as well as for the lives of others in our world. What changes do we need to make so we might see with the eyes of God? Lastly, do we want greater vision in our lives or are we content with the blindness that has been part of our life for many years?





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Making a Report of Sexual Abuse

To inform the Archdiocese of Detroit regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests, deacons and other Church personnel and/or to speak to the Victim Assistance Coordinator contact: (866) 343-**8055.** A caller will be requested to provide his or her name and telephone number. All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. This toll-free number has been established as part of an effort by the Detroit archdiocese to protect children, young people and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes and ministries. This line is for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only. Persons with such complaints are also encouraged to directly contact law enforcement authorities. The Archdiocese of Detroit stands with the brave survivors who seek to bring the crime of child sexual abuse by clergy and other Church representatives into the light, where those who sinned are confronted and those who were harmed can find healing. To those harmed by the actions and inaction of Church leaders: It is inexcusable, and we are sorry. In an effort to consolidate our resources and respond to the faithful's questions about clergy sexual abuse, the Archdiocese of Detroit has created a new "mini" website at protect.aod.org. This site highlights information about reporting abuse. victim assistance, investigations, training for clergy and lay employees and volunteers, and provides additional resources, including messages from Archbishop Vigneron. Our goal is to make this important information - already available on aod.org - more visible, transparent and clear.
