

The purpose of the correspondence is to expound upon the "Family of Parishes" concept. As we are aware, the Catholic church is experiencing a shortage of priests and lower mass attendance. At the current rate, some parishes in the Archdiocese of Detroit may be at risk of closing in the years to come. The notion is that faith communities (i.e. The Lower East Side) can remain viable if the parishes therein operate as a "family". Each parish in our family has a unique role in their respective neighborhoods. For instance:

Nativity of Our Lord has a vibrant food pantry.

Sacred Heart has robust community outreach programs such as health fairs, AA, and NA.

- St. Augustine and St. Monica have an outstanding Crisis Pregnancy outreach.
- St. Charles Borromeo has awesome elderly and special needs outreach programs.
- St. Elizabeth has intergeneration youth engagement.

In short, each parish offers something unique and impactful to the city of Detroit. Closure of any of these locations would negatively impact the viability of our faith community. Hence, it is imperative that we embrace the idea of supporting each other's community involvement efforts as well as attending mass at each other's churches to increase our social and spiritual engagement. Parish Financial News

The Parish Finance Council met 1/29/25 to review our year to date (YTD) progress and to begin planning for our next fiscal budget. We anticipated that at the half way point in the fiscal year of 7/1/24 - 12/31/25, our expenses would exceed our income by about \$34,000. While we have spent less than planned, our collection money is short of what we anticipated, leaving us with a \$40,000 deficit. The council will continue to work with the parish to reduce the deficit, looking for ways to increase money coming in, while keeping a sharp focus on expenses.

There are several areas of good news! The deficit is significantly smaller than last year's and it appears that we will continue to improve. We have solid savings to cushion the shortfall while we work to balance the budget. Also, thanks to generous donors, we have been able to complete several significant long-term improvements over the last 18 months, including a new boiler, gutter replacements and upgrades and upcoming (Spring) tuck pointing work!

Parish Nurse News and Notes

While there is no definitive cure for Alzheimer's disease, there are steps that can be taken to reduce the risk of developing this condition. These evidence-based interventions include:

Lifestyle Modifications:

Maintain a healthy weight: Obesity is a significant risk factor for Alzheimer's.

Engage in regular physical activity: Exercise improves blood flow to the brain and reduces inflammation.

Follow a heart-healthy diet: Consume plenty of fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and fish.

Quit smoking: Smoking damages blood vessels in the brain and increases the risk of Alzheimer's.

Limit alcohol intake: Excessive alcohol consumption can damage brain cells.

Cognitive Stimulation: Challenge your brain with puzzles, games, and learning new skills: This helps keep the brain active and adaptable.

Stay socially engaged: Social interaction reduces stress and improves cognitive function.

Medical Management: Control blood pressure and cholesterol: High blood pressure and cholesterol can damage blood vessels in the brain.

Manage diabetes: High blood sugar levels increase the risk of Alzheimer's.

Consider taking supplements: Some studies suggest that supplements such as vitamin D, omega-3 fatty acids, and curcumin may have protective effects.

Other Recommendations: Get enough sleep: Sleep is essential for brain health.

Avoid head injuries: Protect yourself from falls and other head traumas.

Seek early medical attention: If you notice any cognitive decline, consult a doctor promptly.

It's important to note that these measures may not guarantee the prevention of Alzheimer's disease. However, they can significantly reduce the risk and improve overall brain health. Consult with a healthcare professional for personalized advice and guidance.

A few weeks ago we had over 20 people get their blood pressure taken and 18 people stop by the Corewell Health diabetes table and complete the diabetes screening tool. It looks like people are interested in a diabetes class. We will be asking for more information soon as to what day of the week and time would be best for you to attend a diabetes class. The new class will start in September, 2025.

Remember, progress not perfection. It's hard to make changes to improve your health. Start by small changes. Remember that old saying, How do you eat an elephant? One bite at a time.





St. Charles Mission Statement

We acknowledge that it is the Holy Spirit who calls and empowers us, who strengthens and renews us, and who gives us the will to continue our mission, until Jesus comes.

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms. The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages individuals to report clergy sexual abuse of minors and others directly to law enforcement – no matter when the abuse occurred. The Michigan Attorney General's Office has established a toll-free reporting hotline at (844- 324-3374), Monday through Friday, 8 am to 5pm. (aginvestigations@michigan.gov). Individuals also may contact their local police department. For complaints involving priests, deacons, religious, or laity, individuals are welcomed to contact the Archdiocese of Detroit's Victim Assistance Coordinator at (866) 343-8055 or vac@aod.org.
