Second Sunday of Easter

As we continue to relish the Easter mystery this week, we are given the story of "doubting" Thomas." Thomas has trouble believing that Jesus has risen and is no longer in the tomb. He needs proof! Many of us doubt where Christ is when we go through the difficult moments of our lives. We, like Thomas, want proof and signs that Christ is truly risen. On this Sunday, we also celebrate the feast of Divine Mercy. This Sunday was named as Divine Mercy Sunday by Pope John Paul II in response to the visions of St. Faustina. What I take, most especially, from this day is that many of us doubt the mercy of Christ. We feel we have old mistakes and sins that Christ has not forgiven. We have limited his mercy to our own limitations and spent our lives in tombs of our worst selves. This Divine Mercy Sunday is cloaked in many devotions and prayers but the main reason, for me, to celebrate this day on the Second Sunday of Easter is to celebrate the Easter mystery in deeper ways. Yes, Christ is risen from the dead and his mercy for all of us is overflowing. His mercy is so much more extravagant than we can imagine. If we can't believe that, we have only to read the Gospel today. Jesus returns to the disciples who are cowering in the upper room with all kinds of fear, regret, and shame. These were the same people who denied him, fell asleep when he wanted them to pray with him, and ran away when he needed them the most. Yes, these were his disciples who, in many ways, must have been a terrible disappointment to him. Yet, what does he do? Does he scold them or question why they were so weak on the road to Calvary? No, he just says, "Peace be with you.!" Do we need any further proof of the mercy and love of Christ? If Christ can forgive those who betrayed him, denied him, deserted him, then his mercy can cover us as well!

On this Second Sunday of Easter, may we taste the mercy of Christ in a new way and allow our hearts to feel that mercy. It is a mercy that forgives and calls us to start, again. It is a mercy that frees us rather than ties us to our weaknesses. It is a mercy that calls on us to be merciful to one another. Let's continue the Easter celebration in our lives and allow his mercy to forgive us, his heart to love us, his strength to encourage us, his hope to pull us out of any despair, and his call to live our lives in the best way! Enjoy the blessings of this new week!!

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse:

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms. See

Tens of thousands of Detroit homes are dangerous to live in. A recent U of M study estimated that 24,000 Detroit homes need major fixes, such as leaking roofs, broken furnaces and faulty wiring. That's 5 percent of the city's housing stock. Housing advocates contend the real number is far higher.

Over the next year-and-a-half, all parishes in the archdiocese will join together into groups of three to six, called "Families of Parishes." Going forward, these Families of Parishes will work together, sharing resources and talents to further advance the shared mission of our local Church.

The Family groupings have been compiled in the last few months through consultation with the auxiliary bishops and priests, a process steeped in prayer and with attention given to the best interest of each community.


In the meantime, to help us all better understand why we are moving in this direction. Archbishop Vigneron has written a new Pastoral Note on Families of Parishes, providing some theological context for the transition and introducing a renewed structure for parish ministry to more effectively equip them for their missionary work. Like all Pastoral Notes released in recent years, this new text is informed by and expands upon the steady foundation of Archbishop Vigneron's 2017 Pastoral Letter, Unleash the Gospel.

Looking into the not-toodistant future, Archbishop Vigneron also uses this new Pastoral Note to anticipate the development of Family Missionary Strategic Plans, which will guide each Family of Parishes as it carries out its work in the years to come.
