

This weekend, our young people, **Blake Bell**, **Khloe Pruitt**, **Milan Pruitt**, and **Miles Rennpage** will be receiving their first Holy Communion. This is a beautiful and exciting day for them and their families. The Lord feeds them with His very Body and Blood for the first of many times.

I'm reminded of a sign that appears in many Church sacristies. The sign says:

"Priest of God, celebrate this Mass as if it was your first Mass, your last Mass, your only Mass."

This is a beautiful reminder for priests preparing to celebrate Mass and it is also important for each and every one of us. As we watch second graders receive the Body and Blood of Christ for the first time it should reawaken us to the power of the Eucharist. Receiving the Eucharist for the first time is an incredible experience, yet this is no different than receiving the Holy Eucharist for the 1000th time. It is still the same Lord nourishing us with His Body and Blood.

Maybe our love for Jesus in the Eucharist has grown lukewarm. We don't have the same excitement that we did in second grade. I also ask myself, "Have I lost my fervor of offering Mass compared to when I was a new priest?" It is so easy for Jesus, the Eucharist, and the Mass to become ordinary and commonplace. Maybe it is time to renew our love for Jesus in the Eucharist.

Witnessing our young people receive First Holy Communion can reawaken us to the same joy, wonder, and devotion that they possess. We are receiving the same Body and Blood of Christ as them!

Maybe we can adjust the exhortation to priests toward the entire people of God, saying:

People of God, pray this Mass as if it was your first Mass, your last Mass, your only Mass!

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms. The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages individuals to report clergy sexual abuse of minors and others directly to law enforcement – no matter when the abuse occurred. The Michigan Attorney General's Office has established a toll-free reporting hotline at (844- 324-3374, Monday through Friday, 8 am to 5pm. (aginvestigations@michigan.gov). Individuals also may contact their local police department. For complaints involving priests, deacons, religious, or laity, individuals are welcomed to contact the Archdiocese of Detroit's Victim Assistance Coordinator at (866) 343-8055 or vac@aod.org.
