Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse:

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms. See <u>detroitcatholic.com</u> to learn more. Food for Thought

When we hoard material wealth, we become distrusting, mean, and often paranoid that the things that take the place of our soul will be taken from us, and so we hold material wealth that tighter, that closer to our chests, becoming more distrustful, meaner, and beset by fears at all turns. This is known.

When we hoard emotional wealth—the bounty of our spirit, knowledge, world experience, creativity, joy, and sense of exploration—the word "love" becomes hollow and our sadness rings within us like a terrible gong whose echo carries through our entire waking life, so we hope there is solace in dreams. But the dreams never truly satisfy. This is known.

When we deny the very truths before our eyes, we cease to live. We burrow farther and farther into ourselves, reaching out only to reinforce our fears so that we feel righteous and—in feeling righteous—vindicated. Why vindicated? Because most of us, in our heart of hearts, know that we cling to wrong things, yet if enough of us are similarly wrong, our individual wrong is not so bad.

Just one of the many things we tell ourselves.

How often do we tell ourselves that having enough is good, and giving of excess to those in need is better? How often do we tell ourselves that hating someone for nonsense reasons is *not* proof of loving someone else (or even loving ourselves)? How many times a day do we genuinely attempt to help someone without hoping to gain in some way? Have you bought food for the hungry, smiled givingly, complimented someone so brightly it seemed like the sun took notice and shined just a bit clearer? Life is bounty. Not the pretend wealth of dollars on top of dollars, but the bounty of there being so much within us to give! An inexhaustible supply of love is inside each and every one of us if we're honest enough to listen to what it says about what each of us is doing moment to moment. Love asks us to live in truth. It asks us to give of our hearts, but to examine those hearts as well.

Does your heart lead you to welcome love inward? When your face is upturned is it light you see that makes you want to fling your arms wide, or cloudy cold rain squeezing you to pull your coat tighter around yourself, to shrink and perpetually run for shelter? Let us hope for light. Let us always hope for the living bounty of light.

Stewardship Minute: Living Stewardship

"...For his sake I have accepted the loss of all things and I consider them so much rubbish, that I may gain Christ..." (PHILIPPIANS 3:8)

The first commandment says that we should not put other gods before the Lord. Living **Stewardship** by sharing all of our gifts - our time in prayer, our talent in charitable works and our treasure to support one another, helps us keep God first in everything. It helps us from putting other gods before God. It helps us from becoming a slave to our possessions. It helps us to use our gifts for the glory of God and not for the glory of ourselves.





Dear St. Charles Family,

We at Nativity of Our Lord would like to thank you for your continued support of the food pantry. Since January until the end of March, we have had 346 families come for food. This breaks down to 1042 people fed. Without your support, we couldn't do what we are doing. A special thank you to Janis Ayoub who weekly posts the pantry needs to keep everyone informed.



The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages individuals to report clergy sexual abuse of minors and others directly to law enforcement – no matter when the abuse occurred.

Individuals may also contact the Archdiocese of Detroit. We place no deadlines or time limits on those who wish to come forward for help; be it five, 15, or 50 years later, our diocese accepts and responds to all reports.

The Archdiocese of Detroit reports every complaint it receives, regardless of its source or the date of the alleged activity, to civil authorities. No complaints are held back, pre-screened or disregarded. This is done in accordance with voluntary agreements signed in the spring of 2002 by the archdiocese and prosecutors from all six counties within its boundaries. As a result of the agreements, the archdiocese shared case files of priests accused of sexual misconduct in previous years and committed to turning over all complaints in the future.

How to Report Sexual Abuse

Emergencies

If you suspect someone is in immediate danger, call 911

Law enforcement

Individuals who suspect clergy sexual abuse of children or vulnerable adults are encouraged to contact the Michigan Attorney General's Office by calling its toll-free reporting hotline at (844) 324-3374 (Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.) or by emailing aginvestigations@michigan.gov. Individuals also may contact their local police department.

Mandated reporting

Mandated reporters in Michigan must make an immediate verbal report to the CPS Centralized Intake for Abuse & Neglect at (855) 444-3911, followed by a written report within 72 hours. Reports also can be <u>made online</u>. (See below for <u>more information</u> on mandated reporters.)

Archdiocese of Detroit

The Archdiocese of Detroit's Victim Assistance Coordinator, Tony Latarski, can be reached at **(313) 237-6060** or toll-free at **(866) 343-8055**. Individuals also may email <u>vac@aod.org</u>. Mr. Latarski has an extensive background in law enforcement and works to receive and respond to all complaints. All calls and messages regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. Callers will be asked to provide their name and telephone number.

This contact information is shared as part of an effort by the archdiocese to protect children, young people and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes and ministries. They are for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only.

Reporting a bishop

The **Catholic Bishop Abuse Reporting Service (CBAR)** has been established to receive reports of sexual abuse and related misconduct by bishops and to relay those reports to proper Church authorities for investigation. To make a report, visit <u>ReportBishopAbuse.org</u> or phone (800) 276-1562. When a report includes a crime, such as the sexual abuse of a minor, it will also be reported to civil authorities. Otherwise, reports will be kept confidential.

Reports of sexual misconduct by other Church personnel — priests, deacons, laypersons — should be reported-in using the means described in the above sections.
