

We have been through our own war these last months. We have seen victims fall from this terrible virus. And we have also seen tremendous heroes. I was thinking of the doctor in China who first blew the whistle on this virus and was silenced by the government. He later died from COVID 19. What courage it must have taken to stand up to a government who said he was lying. We have seen everyone from doctors and nurses, nursing assistants and EMTs, firefighters and police officers, grocery store workers and delivery people giving up their lives in this pandemic. As I think of young people going off to war, I often wonder how much they realized the terror and pain of what they were embarking on and how it may cost them their lives. Maybe today, we can take a few moments to call to mind in prayer all of those people who have faced the hell of war and pandemics and all kinds of battles and refused to run. On this feast of the Ascension when Christ promised to send the Spirit among us, may we cry out for that Spirit that led these heroes. They stood there firmly and did not let fear rule them but found that inner strength to keep going. May we thank God this Memorial Day for all of those heroes who have given up their lives so others might live. May they rest in peace. #### Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for accountability universal in response to the horrors of sexual abuse." clergy Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. Pope Francis released his encyclical "Laudato Si" ("Praise be") 5 years ago this month. Pope Francis asks us to contemplate the beauty of the world, and reflect on our place in it, as a channel of God's love to all that lives, plant, animal, and human. Here is Pope Francis' prayer:

Triune Lord, wondrous community of infinite love, teach us to contemplate you in the beauty of the universe, for all things speak of you.

Awaken our praise and thankfulness for every being that you have made. Give us the grace to feel profoundly joined to everything that is.

God of love, show us our place in this world as channels of your love for all the creatures of Earth, for not one of them is forgotten in your sight. Enlighten those who possess power and money that they may avoid the sin of indifference, that they may love the common good, advance the weak, and care for this world in which we live. The poor and Earth are crying out.

O Lord, seize us with your power and light, help us to protect all life, to prepare for a better future, for the coming of your Kingdom of justice, peace, love and beauty. Praise be to you! Amen.
