

# **Sunday Food for Your Soul**

# **Closer Away?**

Your best friend is leaving town. There is no way to change things, it is certain. What do you do with your sorrow? This is the scene we find in the <u>Gospel</u> for the Sixth Sunday of Easter. Jesus is trying to comfort the disciples because he is moving not just to a different town, he is about to move away from the world and into the Father's arms.

# Christianity tells us that Word is the Holy Spirit.

Sounds like what we experience at a funeral. We are truly glad that our beloved no longer has the pains and shortages of this life. But what about us? We who are left behind do not get our burden lifted, we get more added to it. We are lonely for the one who has gone away.

Jesus dove into death and swam to the world's shore, but he could not stay on earth and be just like he was before. As he tells Mary Magdalene, he has to go to the Father. "If you loved me you would rejoice."

He had told the disciples something more, and it is puzzling. "Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid. I am going away and I will come back to you."

Going away but coming back? This is a strange formula, by which Jesus' absence will make him much, much closer to us than he was before.

How can this be?

It is hard to express in so few words, but of course your author will rush in. I cannot guarantee that it will not seem abstract, but let's give it a try.

(1) Start with the pre-Jesus world. God the Father had been with the people for all eons. The First Testament tells about this over and over.

Why is that not enough? Well, God the Father remained unknowable in very important ways. He told one of the prophets he would pass the mouth of the cave where that prophet was, but that the man must not look until God had gone past. (Really it says "you can only look upon my hindermost quarters.") To look directly upon God would destroy a human being (Exodus 33:20).

(2) To close this gap, God decides to tell the world everything about himself in a way it can understand. He speaks his very self to us, and he uses a Word that leaves nothing lacking. Humanity is the language, and Jesus is the Word spoken in that language. Now God can be known insofar as we know Jesus.

(3) Jesus dies, resurrects, and finally ascends to the Father from whom he came. Are we abandoned? No. Just as the Father had done, Jesus then spoke out his own very self in another Word that leaves nothing of himself unsaid.

Christianity tells us that this Word is the Holy Spirit. John's Gospel says it is a Word that is with God, and that *is* God.

It is the interior Spirit of a human being called Jesus, who is already the very interior Spirit of God. We are to be closer to Jesus and to the Father than the apostles were!

If you and I say yes to the Holy Spirit, we will know Jesus just as sheep knew the voice of their shepherd. In knowing him we will know the Father. We will be side by side with the closest presence of the God of love that is possible. We find Jesus in the Great Sacrament, the Mass, in the people around us.

Was it too abstract? Well, it is the story of our very fleshly life with God. Let us put it into action.

# **Parish Financial News**

The Parish Finance Council met 1/29/25 to review our year to date (YTD) progress and to begin planning for our next fiscal budget. We anticipated that at the half-way point in the fiscal year of 7/1/24 - 12/31/25, our expenses would exceed our income by about \$34,000. While we have spent less than planned, our collection money is short of what we anticipated, leaving us with a \$40,000 deficit. The council will continue to work with the parish to reduce the deficit, looking for ways to increase money coming in, while keeping a sharp focus on expenses.

There are several areas of good news! The deficit is significantly smaller than last year's and it appears that we will continue to improve. We have solid savings to cushion the shortfall while we work to balance the budget. Also, thanks to generous donors, we have been able to complete several significant long-term improvements over the last 18 months, including a new boiler, gutter replacements and upgrades and upcoming (Spring) tuck pointing work!

# Finance Committee Report May 18, 2025

We need a church home to be able to gather together. Biblical tradition promotes tithing 10%, but most of us have charitable obligations beyond church, so church is a portion of our giving. Still, we must deal with the reality of paying for St. Charles. No one will pay the bills for us, we need to do this ourselves. God, however, will reward us for our generosity. "Do not rely on so uncertain thing as wealth, but rather on God, who richly provides us with all things for our enjoyment." 1Timothy 6: 17 Jesus reminds us to keep our treasure in heaven where it is truly secure.

Through the first 8 months of the fiscal year, our church operating income is just under \$170,000. Expenses are \$221,000. We are running about \$1,000 short each week. We ask you to consider increasing your support. For those with a middle income, we hope you have a goal of at least \$100 each month. Those who are low income, we are happy to receive less, according to your ability to pay. If you are high income, we will need greater support, based on your ability, to cover our expenses. If you have not been making a contribution, please consider immediately making weekly contributions. If you miss a Sunday, please catch up. If you presently contribute, are you able to increase the amount?

We realize some of you have been generous with CSA. That has helped cover some of the deficit. However, most of the CSA money has been dedicated to church repairs that are in a category separate from our operating budget. We appreciate those who give to the CSA and encourage you to continue. We know that there are some who do not contribute much to the CSA or offertory collection, and we hope that you will reconsider.

We are very careful about how we spend money. No one is getting rich off St. Charles. We are appreciative that we have been able to keep afloat due to the generous gifts of many people. We are in a church environment where the Archdiocese of Detroit is in financial trouble and parishes that are not self-supporting will be closed. Our house is like your house and needs to pay the bills. We had been in a strong financial position and need to get back to it. The last 2 years we have been able to do over \$250,000 of emergency and critical repairs; helped by people in the parish and from the outside. We are here today because we were able to meet the challenge for a new heating system and exterior repairs. We have met our challenges in the past. With your help and God's blessing we can continue to thrive for many years to come.


