

To those who have come to our first public Masses today, "Welcome Back." Please know how good it is to see everyone. I have missed all of you. To those who are watching from bed, we miss you but are very glad you are being cautious and safe. As some of us return from being in our "upper rooms" for the last eleven weeks, we come to celebrate the feast of Pentecost. Just as the Spirit blew through that upper room and moved the disciples to go out to the people, so the Spirit comes to us today to renew us, enflame us with passion for the gospel and give us the gifts to be bold disciples in the world.

These last three months have been a time we have never seen before. I don't ever remember the church closing for any reason in my lifetime. There were heavy snows and power outages, but we kept the doors open and those who could venture out made it to Mass. During this Pandemic, we have been quarantined and homeschooling and working from home. Our routines have been displaced with new ways of going through our days. For some, it has been a welcome relief from the busyness of life while for others it has been sheer torture and loneliness. For some who have had to be full time work at home employee, mom or dad and teacher, the days may have been filled with weariness and lack of patience. It was there that the Spirit gave you perseverance and allowed yourself to see the comical moments and be able to laugh with your children and spouse! For some, the Spirit has been there to give you the patience and gift of understanding to listen to a friend or relative who is afraid. For some, the Spirit has given you the ability to reverence the day. Maybe, as you have had a break from your daily routine, the Spirit has revealed the Divine in the beauty of a sunset or the stars shining brightly on a cloudless night. Whatever you've experienced these last months should not just be yours, they are to be shared. What have you learned as the Spirit blew through your life in these last months? What life lessons have you learned? Generations after us will be talking about the COVID 19 Pandemic. I would hope we would have more to say than how to quarantine. The Spirit is teaching us these days. What have we learned? I hope in the weeks to come we can learn from each other how the Spirit has blown through our lives during this sacred moment. Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful!

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for accountability universal in response to the horrors of sexual abuse." clergy Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. God of love, show us our place in this world as channels of your love for all the creatures of Earth, for not one of them is forgotten in your sight. Enlighten those who possess power and money that they may avoid the sin of indifference, that they may love the common good, advance the weak, and care for this world in which we live. The poor and Earth are crying out.

O Lord, seize us with your power and light, help us to protect all life, to prepare for a better future, for the coming of your Kingdom of justice, peace, love and beauty. Praise be to you! Amen.
