I find myself crying about nothing and then laughing as I think about someone or something that brought me to that belly laugh where I couldn't breathe anymore. Those are the best laughs! I've thought of all the times people have let me in that private space of their lives with struggles and fears and hopes and worries that no one else knew about. What a privilege to be invited into someone's deepest heart and soul. I think of the joy of baptisms and the hope of new life springing in our lives through these beautiful babies. I have been inspired by all the caretakers who so quietly and lovingly tend to ill spouses, sick children, and ailing parents. I think of the goodness of so many people who have volunteered endless hours of work for the Pantry and Christmas program at Nativity; for the wonder of our friends on Grand Blvd who just soak up the love of parishioners at St. Charles; for the First Communions and Confirmations where nervous children received those powerful sacraments; for the weddings that were filled with tenderness and the deepest love; for the weekday Eucharists around the Dining Room tables where everyone was welcome and the compassion around the table fed those who were hungry for a companion on the journey who would not judge or scold or offer anything but a hand and a heart; and for the funerals at both parishes where everyone came around grieving families to remind them that their parish family would never leave them even when it got tough.

In these years in Detroit, God has been so good to me. I have been able to meet you. We have laughed together at the silliest things. We have cried when our hearts have been broken by life. You have inspired me by your faithfulness to the Gospel and all the quiet things you do for others that no one knows about but God. Yes, this has been quite a journey and we part as better people because we've met each other. Our hearts are broken because we let each other in. As hard as this is, I would never exchange the wonder of these years for less grief. No, the grief is part of the deal with love and the grief reminds us of not what we've lost but what we've had. You have made me so much better over these years and I will be forever in your debt for all your goodness and kindness. As Paul reminds us, "Love never ends." We will carry those words with us, and our hearts will carry each other. With much gratitude for all you are to me!

#### Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse:

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse, Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms. See

Tens of thousands of Detroit homes are dangerous to live in. A recent U of M study estimated that 24,000 Detroit homes need major fixes, such as leaking roofs, broken furnaces and faulty wiring. That's 5 percent of the city's housing stock. Housing advocates contend the real number is far higher. **Detroit Home Repair Resource Guide** is a 2019 list of many nonprofits and other agencies that offer help for residents. #### Led By the Spirit On Mission

Over the next year-and-a-half, all parishes in the archdiocese will join together into groups of three to six, called "Families of Parishes." Going forward, these Families of Parishes will work together, sharing resources and talents to further advance the shared mission of our local Church. The Family groupings have been compiled in the last few months through consultation with the auxiliary bishops and priests, a process steeped in prayer and with attention given to the best interest of each community. In the meantime, to help us all better understand why we are moving in this direction, Archbishop Vigneron has written a new Pastoral Note on Families of Parishes, providing some

theological context for the transition and introducing a renewed structure for parish ministry to more effectively equip them for their missionary work. Like all Pastoral

Notes released in recent years, this new text is informed by and expands upon the steady foundation of Archbishop Vigneron's 2017 Pastoral Letter, Unleash the Gospel.

Looking into the not-too-distant future, Archbishop Vigneron also uses this new Pastoral Note to anticipate the development of Family Missionary Strategic Plans, which will guide each Family of Parishes as it carries out its work in the years to come.
