# Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Paul's letter to the Philippians today encourages us to take the high road even if others are not at their best:

"Brothers and Sisters: if there is any encouragement in Christ, any solace in love, any participation in the Spirit, any compassion and mercy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, with the same love, united in heart, thinking one thing. Do nothing out of selfishness or out of vainglory; rather humbly regard others as more important than yourselves, each looking out not for their own interests, but also for those of others."

We are in troubling times these days with divisions of all kinds. We hear of violence each day, injustices in our legal system to persons of color, political divisiveness, and just plain mean spiritedness towards one another. With the death of Ruth Bader Ginsberg last week, I was thinking of how offensive it must have been to her family when within hours of the reports of her death, all the political camps were making statements as to who and when a replacement would be filled on the Supreme Court. Some were in favor of the quick replacement and others ready to fight. It saddened me to realize we could not wait until after her funeral to talk of such things. Then I heard about her relationship with Antonin Scalia. Scalia was the polar opposite of Bader Ginsberg, yet they were friends who respected each other and could put their differences aside and enjoy each other's company and goodness. They were able to disagree on the interpretations of the law without disrespecting each other. It's that respect and ability to see beyond our differences to the wonder of the other that I hope for all of us. We have been through (and continue to go through) the COVID 19 pandemic. That should be enough to remind us that each of our lives are precious and honorable and good. As Paul reminds us, it's not about us but about the other person. Let's try to be kinder this week and continue to remember the common goodness that unites us.

### Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual Archbishop abuse," Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a physical. lifetime of emotional and spiritual sufferina because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. ### Mass Dispensation Update from Father Stephen Pullis, Director of the Archdiocese of Detroit Department of Evangelization and Missionary Discipleship and member of the liturgical team advising Archbishop Vigneron during the coronavirus pandemic:

In light of the continued spread of the coronavirus in southeast Michigan and the impossibility for parishes to safely accommodate all Catholics for Mass on Sundays, Archbishop Vigneron has extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation for all the faithful in the Archdiocese of Detroit, as well as for all travelers during their time within the territory of the Archdiocese of Detroit, until Monday, November 23, 2020.

### **Civil Responsibility**

In the Catholic Tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation. "People in every nation enhance the social dimension of their lives by acting as committed and responsible citizens" *(Evangelii Gaudium, no. 220).* 

The obligation to participate in political life is rooted in our baptismal commitment to follow Jesus Christ and to bear Christian witness in all we do. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "It is necessary that all participate, each according to his position and role, in promoting the common good. This obligation is inherent in the dignity of the human person. ... As far as possible citizens should take an active part in public life" (*nos. 1913-1915*).
