

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a physical, lifetime of emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. Mass Dispensation Update from Father Stephen Pullis, Director of the Archdiocese of Detroit Department of Evangelization and Missionary Discipleship and member of the liturgical team advising Archbishop Vigneron during the coronavirus pandemic:

In light of the continued spread of the coronavirus in southeast Michigan and the impossibility for parishes to safely accommodate all Catholics for Mass on Sundays, Archbishop Vigneron has extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation for all the faithful in the Archdiocese of Detroit, as well as for all travelers during their time within the territory of the Archdiocese of Detroit, until Monday, November 23, 2020.

Civil Responsibility

In the Catholic Tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation. "People in every nation enhance the social dimension of their lives by acting as committed and responsible citizens" *(Evangelii Gaudium, no. 220).* The obligation to participate in political life is rooted in our baptismal commitment to follow Jesus Christ and to bear Christian witness in all we do. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "It is necessary that all participate, each according to his position and role, in promoting the common good. This obligation is inherent in the dignity of the human person. ... As far as possible citizens should take an active part in public life" *(nos. 1913-1915).*

Stewardship Minute

Today, in St. Matthew's Gospel, the evangelist recounts Jesus' telling of a parable to the chief priests and elders. A landowner (God) plants a vineyard, leases it out, then goes on a journey. When vintage time draws near, He twice sends His servants for the produce. Christ describes how the tenants (the Israelites) reject the servants (God's prophets) and even kill the landowner's son (Jesus, symbolizing His dying for our sins). Our Lord and Savior becomes the cornerstone the builders reject. In the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, a vineyard that yields bad grapes is related to Israel's sinfulness. God's Kingdom will be given to those who produce abundant fruit. As Paschal stewards strengthened by the Eucharist, we strive to produce good fruit in our lives — good works through acts of Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy.

"There's a beauty that comes with Michigan's autumnal air which rivals the marvelous fireworks displays put on by the artistic trees. Mornings and evenings feel quieter, the air's playful nips urge us not to be so serious, and inhaling deeply brings to mind a mug of water on a hot day. Things are chaotic in many of our lives now, but take a moment to stop, be still, and breathe."
