

This week we have seen our Governor as a target in a kidnapping attempt. It sounds like an action/ suspense thriller! Who could have believed all of this? Some white supremacists have decided that the mandates and executive orders Governor Whitmer had enacted were infringing on their rights. Wow...in the midst of the pandemic, face coverings and closing down in order to keep people safe is tyrannical. What are the real issues? It's usually about fear. Fear of change or losing power can move people to violence and see others as the enemy. In the midst of the Black Lives Matter movement and other calls for equal justice before the law and the possibility of a woman of color in the second position in our government has brought out many fears. People can see that the world is changing, and they become fearful that they may not be able to hold on to the power they once had. As their name implies, white supremacists are claiming that the supremacy of the white race is crucial, and all other races and peoples are inferior. Although we may have great disdain for white supremacists, they call me (and us) to look at our own implied biases.

These are my questions and they may not be yours, so please take no offense. As a white man, do I feel the same way when I see a group of white youths coming toward me as I do of a group of black youths? Do I wonder when I see a person of color in a position of power how they've achieved that position? Would I think that way with a white person in a position of power? What do I think when I see a person of color in an expensive car or an expensive suit or living in a prestigious community? Do I wonder how they attained that wealth? Would I even think about that if it were a white person? I can hear some saying, "here he goes again!" but I ask these questions because if I'm honest with myself, I have to admit that some of these questions are just below my surface. They are so deep within my psyche that they are there even before I have time to think about what they imply. They call me to continue to look at my own worldview and how I see the other person who may look a bit different from me. Most of these issues have laid dormant for many years and now we have seen Charlottesville, Mother Emmanuel Baptist Church, and now the white supremacists wanting to kidnap the governor and topple the state government. As frightening as these times might seem, they are also a time for personal conversion in our own lives. Systemic conversion can only come when we, personally, confront our own prejudices. May we continue to search our hearts and minds for areas of blindness within ourselves so that our world may be a safer and sacred place for all people.

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' **Global Rules for Reporting** Abuse: "No One Above Civil or God's Law"

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a physical. lifetime of emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9. They go into effect June 1. Mass Dispensation Update from Father Stephen Pullis, Director of the Archdiocese of Detroit Department of Evangelization and Missionary Discipleship and member of the liturgical team advising Archbishop Vigneron during the coronavirus pandemic:

In light of the continued spread of the coronavirus in southeast Michigan and the impossibility for parishes to safely accommodate all Catholics for Mass on Sundays, Archbishop Vigneron has extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation for all the faithful in the Archdiocese of Detroit, as well as for all travelers during their time within the territory of the Archdiocese of Detroit, until Monday, November 23, 2020.

Civil Responsibility

In the Catholic Tradition, responsible citizenship is a virtue, and participation in political life is a moral obligation. "People in every nation enhance the social dimension of their lives by acting as committed and responsible citizens" (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 220). The obligation to participate in political life is rooted in our baptismal commitment to follow Jesus Christ and to bear Christian witness in all we do. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us, "It is necessary that all participate, each according to his position and role, in promoting the common good. This obligation is inherent in the dignity of the human person. ... As far as possible citizens should take an active part in public life" (nos. 1913-1915).
