

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Sorry to say I will not be at the 11:30am Mass today. Nativity is having their yearly Alumni and Friends Sunday today and I have to stay after the 9:45am Mass and schmooze a bit! I will miss you but I'm sure you'll be delighted by my replacement!! I'll see you next Sunday

The Gospel gives us a lot to think about this Sunday. Jesus asks the rich young man to sell all he has and give the money to the poor. He looks at the young man with love and invites him to go deeper in his relationship with Christ. The rich young man leaves very sad because he has many possessions. How many of us would be willing to give all we have to the poor? That means our homes, cars, clothing, cash, etc? I just wonder how many Christians there would be if selling all you had was a prerequisite to joining the disciples of Jesus. We all like our "stuff." Stuff can be material goods, but it can also be careers, reputations, the ability to control others, self- righteousness, holding on to grudges, lack of forgiveness and the list goes on. We like those things that give us security or status or comfort or self-worth. So, what might Jesus be asking for us to give up so we can follow him more closely?

I think the question may be where we find our security. Do we find it in the way we look, or where we live or what job we have or had or what education we've received or what friends we hang around with or how much we know? Where does our security lie? Christ is calling us to "let go" of all those things that distract us from his love for us. He calls us to find our security in him. In the second reading to the Hebrews, Paul reminds us that the Lord knows us better than we know ourselves. He sees through our false sense of security. The bottom line is that although we may think we have control over things in our life, anything can happen in a split second that changes the whole course of our lives. I don't remember who wrote it, but someone said that we spend the first half of our lives building and collecting. We build our education, our careers, our families, our houses, our reputations, etc., and we spend the second half of our lives letting go of the titles, the material goods, our careers, all the things we collected and thought were so important in the first half. To truly be wise, we have to find a way to let go and give our lives away without holding back. That's true freedom!

Making a Report of Sexual Abuse

To inform the Archdiocese of Detroit regarding the sexual abuse of minors by priests, deacons and other Church personnel and/or to speak to the Victim Assistance Coordinator contact: **(866) 343-8055**. A caller will be requested to provide his or her name and telephone number. All calls regarding complaints of sexual abuse will be returned in a timely manner. This toll-free number has been established as part of an effort by the Detroit archdiocese to protect children, young people and other vulnerable people in our schools, parishes and ministries. This line is for reporting suspected sexual misconduct or child abuse within archdiocesan institutions and ministries only. Persons with such complaints are also encouraged to directly contact law enforcement authorities.

The Archdiocese of Detroit stands with the brave survivors who seek to bring the crime of child sexual abuse by clergy and other Church representatives into the light, where those who sinned are confronted and those who were harmed can find healing. To those harmed by the actions and inaction of Church leaders: It is inexcusable, and we are sorry. In an effort to consolidate our resources and respond to the faithful's questions about clergy sexual abuse, the Archdiocese of Detroit has created a new "mini" website at protect.aod.org. This site highlights information about reporting abuse, victim assistance, investigations, training for clergy and lay employees and volunteers, and provides additional resources, including messages from Archbishop Vigneron. Our goal is to make this important information – already available on *aod.org* – more visible, transparent and clear.
