I get to be with you again today because of a schedule change. Congratulations to the chili cook-off winner (mine was the one with the savory burnt flavor) and thanks to all those who took part.

Sacrament of Reconciliation. Because of the tight Sunday morning schedule, it's hard to have confessions before Mass on Sunday, as many parishes do. The Capuchins have confessions at the monastery Monday through Saturday 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.. If you'd like to meet me for confession, we'll find the time; please stop me on Sunday or call the rectory.

Covid19 protocols. The Center for Disease Control has lifted its warning about social distancing at six feet. Because a good number of our parishioners have underlying health concerns or are caring for those who have such concerns, we will continue to social distance and wear masks in the part of the church in front of the ambo. If you are symptom free, please feel free to sit on the choir side of the church. Everyone will continue to wear masks. Southeast Michigan still has a high level of the virus being transmitted.

Holy Communion. We again have the option of receiving the real presence of Jesus in the chalice. The Holy Spirit made clear a thousand years ago that when we receive Jesus in only one form (usually under the appearance of bread), we receive the whole Lord. So, we don't have to receive both forms in order to be fully united sacramentally with the Lord.

FOCUS. With this copy of the bulletin is a copy of the latest *FOCUS*, the advocacy publication of the Michigan Catholic Conference. The Church cannot advocate for any candidate or political party, but every faith community can advocate on issues and specific laws. The topic this month is **Protect Life**. The byline reads **“Vote No on Proposal 3.”** If you are not sure about this proposal or are in support of it, I particularly ask you to read the publication. Obviously, we each vote our consciences; this publication can help inform our consciences about this proposed legislation from the viewpoint of Catholic social teaching. If you'd like to talk about this further, or any of the other social issues we're focusing on these weeks, please let me know. We'll find the time to talk.

Family Mass schedule during the week. Daily hearing the Word preached and receiving Holy Communion are wonderful ways of staying in union with Christ. In our family, Mass is offered on Tuesdays at Sacred Heart at 5 PM, on Wednesdays at St. Augustine/St. Monica at 9 AM, at Nativity on Thursdays at 9 AM, and each Friday at St. Charles at 11.

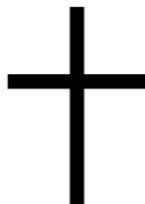

Archbishop Vigneron's statement on Pope Francis' Global Rules for Reporting Abuse

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior. "I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law." Pope Francis announced the new norms. The Archdiocese of Detroit encourages individuals to report clergy sexual abuse of minors and others directly to law enforcement – no matter when the abuse occurred. The Michigan Attorney General's Office has established a toll-free reporting hotline at (844- 324-3374, Monday through Friday, 8 am to 5pm. aginvestigations@michigan.gov). Individuals also may contact their local police department. For complaints involving priests, deacons, religious, or laity, individuals are welcomed to contact the Archdiocese of Detroit's Victim Assistance Coordinator at (866) 343-8055 or vac@aod.org.

Preferential Option for the Poor

Exodus 22:20-22 ESV You shall not oppress or afflict a resident alien, for you were once aliens residing in the land of Egypt. You shall not wrong any widow or orphan. If ever you wrong them and they cry out to me, I will surely listen to their cry.

Psalms 69:33 ESV For the LORD hears the needy and does not despise his own people who are prisoners.

Proverbs 19:17 ESV Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the Lord, and he will repay him for his deed.

Michigan Catholic Conference. The Church calls for Catholics "to promote the well-being of all, especially the poor and vulnerable." Across the state, too many Michiganders are struggling to find work, access to educational opportunities, and even basic needs. Policies implemented during the COVID-19 pandemic intended to stop the virus have produced high unemployment and shuttered businesses, devastating local families and exasperating social concerns such as addiction and abuse. Legislative policies will likely arise out of the pandemic to assist those who have been impacted. Within the legislative process, MCC will support:

- Tax policies that support marriage, families, and low-income residents.
 - The allocation of state budget resources to provide critical services for vulnerable persons, especially health care, food, and heating assistance.
 - Energy policies and regulations which promote competition, support for low-income ratepayers, and foster environmental stewardship.
-
- Affordable housing for low- and moderate-income families and individuals.
 - Affordable and accessible transportation options for low- and moderate-income workers.
 - Policies that support fair and adequate working conditions for all employees.
 - Policies that foster and promote employment for Michigan residents.
 - Opposition to policies that prey upon the vulnerable, such as predatory payday lending.¹

Pope Paul VI. "The Gospel instructs us in the preferential respect due to the poor and the special situation they have in society: the more fortunate should renounce some of their rights so as to place their goods more generously at the service of others."²

Pope John Paul II. This love of preference for the poor, and the decisions which it inspires in us, cannot but embrace the immense multitudes of the hungry, the needy, the homeless, those without medical care and, above all, those without hope of a better future. It is impossible not to take account of the existence of these realities. To ignore them would mean becoming like the "rich man" who pretended not to know the beggar Lazarus lying at his gate (cf. Lk 16:19-31).⁷⁷ Our daily life as well as our decisions in the political and economic fields must be marked by these realities.³

Pope Francis. We have to state, without mincing words, that there is an inseparable bond between our faith and the poor. May we never abandon them.⁴

Each individual Christian and every community is called to be an instrument of God for the liberation and promotion of the poor, and for enabling them to be fully a part of society. This demands that we be docile and attentive to the cry of the poor and to come to their aid.⁵

Sometimes we are tempted to be that kind of Christian who keeps the Lord's wounds at arm's length. Yet Jesus wants us to touch human misery, to touch the suffering flesh of others.⁶

DEFEAT THE ANYTHING GOES ABORTION AMENDMENT

In the November election, the Catholic bishops in Michigan are urging all Michiganders to vote **NO** on Proposal 3. The measure would add an amendment to the state constitution to:

- Legalize abortion at any time in pregnancy for any reason.
- Allow abortions to be performed by anyone, even those without a medical license.
- Allow any person to help teens obtain abortions without their parents knowing.
- Protect abortion providers from penalties for killing or injuring a woman during an abortion.
- Revoke state law that requires abortion facilities to be licensed and inspected.
- Require taxpayers to pay for abortions.

his amendment allows abortion for:

- **ANY ONE:** any age...including minors
- **ANY TIME:** up to the moment of birth...and beyond birth
- **ANY WHERE:** in a medical facility...or any other location

Vote **NO**

- On legal abortion through all nine months of pregnancy for any reason.
- On anyone performing abortions.
- On ending parental consent for teenage abortions.
- On allowing legal immunity for medical and non-medical abortionists.

Help Defeat Proposal 3

- Vote **NO**, either in person on Nov. 8, or by absentee ballot beforehand.
- Check your voter registration status and learn more about how to make sure you vote properly by visiting the Michigan Voter Information Center at mvic.sos.state.mi.us
- Encourage your relatives, friends, coworkers, and parishioners to register to vote and vote **NO** on this proposal.
- Pray that the outcome of election may be one that will protect and uphold the dignity of human life.
